ONTARIO AVALANCHE @ VALENCIA FLYERS Avalanche continue to make noise in Western Division race

This was a big measuring stick series between two teams near the top of their respective division standings. The Utah Outliers have won 16 of their last 18 games, with their only losses in that span coming against division-leading Ogden. The Outliers made a statement by sweeping three games from the Icemen, winning each game by four goals or more.

Nine different Utah players scored in the Outliers' 9-2 win on Friday. Three goals in the final 8:10 of the second period gave them a 5-2 lead at the second intermission and they added four unanswered tallies in the third period.

Junior hockey does not get much better that the three-game series between the Idaho IceCats and Ogden Mustangs at the Ice Sheet in Ogden over the weekend. The Mustangs tagged the previously undefeated IceCats with two losses, picking up five crucial points as they face pressure in the Mountain Division race. Idaho maintains a comfortable lead in the Northwest Division, but now has a to-do-list as they work to fine-tune their game in advance of the Western States Shootout.

Friday's series opener was a fantastic hockey game. Idaho took a 2-0 lead into the third period thanks to goaltender Tyler Matthews, who stopped all 29 shots he faced through the first 40 minutes, but he could not keep the Mustangs contained all night. Rhett Rampinelli put Ogden on the board 1:13 into the final frame, then Mustangs' leading scorer Matus Spodniak knotted the score, 2-2, at 6:15.

With the game still ties, Ogden took a penalty with 3:18 remaining, killed it off, then scored with 1:10 left to take their first lead of the night. Spodniak intercepted a cross-ice pass in the neutral zone, skated down the right wing, and put a wrist shot inside the far post for a 3-2 Mustangs lead.

Moments later, Spodniak forced another neutral zone turnover, skated into the Idaho zone with the puck and, despite an open look at an empty net for a hat trick, dished the puck over to Jacob Laurin who slammed the it into the empty cage with 30 seconds remaining. That put the finishing touches on a 4-2 win for Ogden.

Mustangs netminder Daniel Pavlicko made several key saves in the third period to preserve the win and finished the night with 25 saves. Matthews made 40 saves for Idaho.

The two teams went right back at it Saturday night and the intensity level did not drop off.

Three times the Mustangs took the lead on home ice, and three times the IceCats came back to tie it up, before winning the game 2:36 into suddendeath on a goal by Jackson York – Idaho's first lead of the night.

Ogden had leads of 1-0 and 2-1 and Idaho came up with the equalizer both times, but in the second period, the Mustangs scored a pair of goals just 16 seconds apart to take their first two-goal lead of the contest. The IceCats answered just 46 seconds later, getting back within a goal, but would have to wait a little bit longer for the tying goal this time.

With the score tied, 2-2, Ross Bartlett retrieved a puck in the corner to the right of IceCats netminder Jacob Hough, spun, and threw the puck at the net from a severe-angle. Somehow the puck managed to bank in off Hough's pads to give the Mustangs their third lead of the game.

Moments later, Hough failed to cover up the rebound on a long shot from Bryson Bartell just inside the blue line on the right wing. Bartell followed his own shot, charging the net, and getting his stick on the puck to poke it in to make it 4-2 Ogden.

That sent the Ogden fans into a frenzy, but John Olver's Idaho team regained their composure. On a dump-in, Pavlicko and his defenseman miscommunicated, allowing Jacob Hedencrona to sweep in, take the puck, and circle the net, depositing it on his backhand to squelch the Ogden momentum.

The only goal of the third period came 3:03 in and tied the game yet again. Ogden broke the puck out of their end, but turned the puck over just outside their own blue line, allowing an Idaho counter-attack. In the ensuing scramble in front of the Ogden net, the puck came to Alexander Westin and he fired it through a maze of sticks and legs for his second goal of the game, evening things up. 4-4.

The two teams battled back and forth for the final 16:57 without either team managing to score. Ogden's Pavlicko (23 saves) and Idaho's Hough (31 saves) both had to be sharp throughout the frame.

In the four-on-four overtime, Ogden had a great chance to win it, but Hough denied Spodniak on a point-blank backhand attempt. Later, York broke up the play at his blue line, corralled the puck and skated up the right wing. He fired a bullet from the top of the circle over Pavlicko's blocker for the winner. York was spilled to the ice on a hip check as he released the puck, and stayed

motionless on the ice for a few moments, setting the tone for Sunday's rubber match.

The final game of the series was just as exciting as the first two.

Idaho led, 4-3 after two periods, but Ogden's Matt McClelland scored his second goal of the game just 31 seconds into the period to tie things up. A severe-angle shot hit Idaho netminder Shaun Brown in the shoulder, bounced up, then came down on the goal line. McClelland crashed the net and finished it to tie the game.

Spondniak, who collected assists on all of the first four Ogden goals, scored himself with 12:30 left to give the Mustangs a 5-4 lead. As he crossed the Idaho blue line he made a backhand pass to Bartlett on the left wing boards. Bartlett gave it back to him on a perfect give-and-go and Spodniak sniped it right under the bar over Brown's left shoulder.

Ogden successfully protected the one-goal lead for the final 12:30 with Pavlicko again providing key saves among his 31 for the game.

Shaun Brown, the third starting netminder in three days for Idaho, made 35 saves for the IceCats.

CASPER COYOTES @ CHEYENNE STAMPEDE Coyotes sweep in Cheyenne

The Casper Coyotes and Cheyenne Stampede met for the second consecutive weekend, this time in Cheyenne, but the result was the same – a Casper sweep.

The Coyotes peppered the Cheynne net with 61 shots in Friday's series opener, but Stampede netminder Robbie Hufnagel turned in a 55-save performance to keep the score respectable. Casper managed two goals in each period of a 6-2 win.

Michael Syring scored twice for Casper and Nolan Kare made 25 saves.

SPRINGFIELD EXPRESS @ OKLAHOMA CITY BLAZERS Express show signs of life in OKC, but Blazers remain undefeated

The Oklahoma City Blazers managed to (barely) keep their perfect record intact, sandwiching a pair of one-goal wins around a 10-1 blowout, in a three-game sweep of the visiting Springfield Express.

The Blazers had to come back from a 4-1 second-period deficit to tie Friday's game and force overtime. Patrick Tondl scored 1:38 into the second (3-on-3) overtime to give the Blazers a big comeback win.

There was only one goal scored in the first period, but a flurry of scoring early in the second. Frank Kupka gave the Express a 2-0 lead 90 seconds into the frame, but OKC responded with their first goal 40 seconds later – an unassisted tally by Dionne Demke. Less than a minute later, Arkhip Ledenkov, restored the two-goal lead for the Express and, at 5:37, Bruno Ndossi made it 4-1 Springfield.

Oklahoma City got one late in the second to make it 4-2 heading into the third. Griffen Wiencek scored in the first minute of the third period to get the Blazers within a goal and Demke's second goal of the game, with 6:27 remaining, tied the score.

Lukas Slansky assisted on the final three goals of the game for Oklahoma City – including the tying and winning goals.

Bobby Cloutier allowed four goals in the first two periods, but stopped all nine shots he faced in the third period and overtime, allowing the Blazers to stage their comeback.

Saturday's game lacked the intrigue of Friday's. Ndossi scored for Springfield 16 seconds into the game to give the Express a 1-0 lead, but four Blazers skaters scored two goals each in a 10-1 OKC rout.
